SKIN SURGERY AND WOUND CARE GUIDE

WHAT IS SKIN SURGERY?

- Removal of a skin lesion, such as a skin cancer, mole, cyst, or lipoma, by cutting the skin and repairing the area with stitches. This procedure is performed under local anesthesia (numbing shots).
- Your specimen(s) are sent to a pathology lab, *Skin Diagnostics*, for diagnosis confirmation or to see if all of the cancer was removed. They will process and file your insurance for you. You will receive a bill from them if you have an unmet deductible.
- The risks of surgery include: bleeding, bruising, infection, breaking of the stitches and opening of wound, numbness, recurrence or persistence (requiring a second procedure), and scarring. A scar will result from any procedure that removes a sample of skin. The type of scar that forms depends on the way the patient's skin heals. Some skin forms abnormal scars (keloids).

PREPARING FOR YOUR PROCEDURE

- Notify your doctor if you take any blood thinning medication. You do **NOT** need to stop it, unless directed by your doctor.
- Notify your doctor if you have a pacemaker or defibrillator, allergy to latex or numbing medication, or artificial heart valve or joint.
- Wash the area with soap and water prior to the appointment and avoid wearing make-up or jewelry.
- Eat a light meal prior to your appointment
- You will **NOT** be given any medications which will make you sleepy or drowsy, but may want to bring a driver, especially if you are having a procedure on your head or neck.

WOUND CARE AFTER YOUR PROCEDURE

- A pressure dressing will be applied and should remain in place for 24-48 hours. Do not get the area wet during this time.
- Once the dressing is removed, gently wash the site with soap and water, or shampoo if on the scalp, twice daily and pat dry.
- Do not let the wound dry out. Cover the site with Vaseline or Aquaphor Healing Ointment and a bandage. An antibiotic ointment (Neosporin) may be used but is not necessary.
- Rarely, the site may bleed after you leave the clinic.
 - Apply direct pressure to the wound for 10-20 minutes if this occurs.
 - If bleeding continues, you should contact our office.
- It is normal for your site to have red edges.
- Signs of infection include: Bright red appearance, swelling, pain to touch, & thick yellow drainage or pus
- Do not swim or perform activities (i.e. sports or exercise) that pull on the stitches.
- If you have pain or discomfort, you may take acetaminophen (Tylenol) or Ibuprofen (Advil or Motrin).
- **You will most likely have stitches that will need to be removed 7-14 days after the surgery.**
